1 in 4 girls in mixed-sex schools had experiences of unwanted sexual touching in school. 6 in 10 women have felt harassed in the gym by a man.

1.7 million women experienced domestic abuse in the year ending March 2022.

STOP PRESS 2024 RESOLUTION SHORTLIST MEETING

The short list of resolutions 2024 is listed below.

As announced at the ACM this week a chance for members to come and hear expert speakers talk about each resolution has been arranged for **Tuesday 28 November 2pm - 4pm at Wellington Community Centre (HR4 8AZ).**

Free to attend and join the discussion/debate. Refreshments available.

1. Dental Health Matters

There is a chronic shortage of NHS Dentists and people are suffering health issues as a result. The NFWI calls on the Government to increase investment in the training and retention of dentists and to review the current inadequate NHS contracts in order to ensure everyone can access an NHS dentist wherever they live.

2. Impacts of poor housing conditions

Poor housing can have a deleterious effect on human health and wellbeing, safety and quality of life and can disproportionately affect the most vulnerable groups in society. The NFWI calls on the UK Government to boost housing standards and regulations, increase funding for housing renovations, increase the supply of affordable and secure housing and strengthen collaboration with local authorities, housing associations and other relevant stakeholders to develop strategies that address local housing challenges.

3. Say 'no' to gambling advertising

Harm caused by excessive gambling is a global problem. Some countries are already addressing this by banning advertising. The NFWI calls on members, the government, regulators, the NHS, educationalists and gambling charities to work together towards achieving a complete ban on gambling advertising. This will reduce gambling harm, save the NHS money, protect family relationships and decrease the number of suicides, around 400 per annum at present.

4. Improving Outcomes for Women in the Criminal Justice System

There is an urgent need to radically reform decision making in respect of women in the criminal justice system and in particular, pregnant women and women with children. We urge cross government collaboration to deliver on the 2018 female offender strategy by setting goals, robust governance and performance measures to reduce the number of women who have committed non-violent offences from being imprisoned.

NEWS FROM THE ARCHIVES

The theme of the archive display at the recent WI Day, held in Bodenham Parish Hall, was Federation anniversaries and how they were celebrated. I am grateful to Margaret and both Carolines in WI House for searching out the memorabilia held there. The table was covered with two anniversary tablecloths – the centennial (worked by Jenny Winchester, Bishopswood WI) facing into the hall and the fiftieth (designed by Pamerla Fortnum, Putley WI) to the back. The backdrop showed two tea towels marking the sixtieth (designed by Ruth Robson, Llangrove WI) and one hundredth milestones. On the stage behind was the huge wall hanging worked by the Crafts Committee to celebrate the 75th anniversary in 1995. Sadly the central circular section, originally made of plastic, has since disintegrated. Photographs on display showed the unveiling with the missing part. This inspired Federation Assistant Secretary, Caroline Miller, to plan a project to revive the absent piece. *Archival note – plastic and archives are not a good mix and should be avoided.*

Also marking the golden jubilee was a Review leaflet and a schedule for an exhibition held in the Shirehall. The Review made reference to ball point and fibre tipped pens marking the occasion but I doubt any are still in existence. An Order of Service and photograph of the WI Choir marked the Diamond Jubilee Service in Hereford Cathedral; an additional piece of memorabilia was a souvenir plate. The biggest undertaking for the seventieth anniversary was filling the Cathedral with an impressive array of flower arrangements on the theme of Home and Country. This event was recorded in a special booklet on display. The HFWI County News (forerunner of the HFWI newsletter) indicated that a thimble and box (£1.20), mug with logo (£1.25) and cut glass tumbler (£10.50 or 3 for £30) were available as souvenir items. Only the tumbler was available for display.

Long standing WI ladies were very interested in the record that holds the signatures of all members, by WI, in 1995 and many memories were shared. Photographs of floral displays at the Grange in Leominster and a souvenir plate marking the eightieth anniversary were on display; as was an order of Service for the Choral Evensong in 2005. Centenary items on the table included souvenir mugs, bag and

the Centennial Service programme.

Please let me know if you have any other souvenir items so that they can be recorded in the WI catalogue.

Herefordshire WI National Annual Conference, London Tuesday 4th - Wednesday 5th June 2024

Tuesday Holland Park & Gardens, Kensington

The Holland Park and gardens were created in the early 1800s by Lord Holland and cover some 50 acres. There is the immaculately kept Kyoto Garden which was opened in 1991 to celebrate the Japanese festival. This has a delightful pond with waterfall.

The Design Museum, Kensington

Founded in 1989 by Sir Terence Conran, the Design Museum exhibits product, industrial, graphic, fashion, and architectural design. The Designer Maker User exhibition features almost 1000 items of twentieth and twenty-first century design viewed through the angles of the designer, manufacturer and user.

Free time in Notting Hill

Markets, a carnival and a movie of the same name, Notting Hill is one of London's most vibrant neighbourhoods. The Shops of Notting Hill range from Westbourne Grove's upscale boutiques to colourful vintage and antique shops on Portobello Road.

Wednesday The British Museum, Bloomsbury

Founded in 1753, the British Museum has a collection covering two million years and was the world's first public museum of its kind and attracts more than six million visitors each year.

V&A Museum, Natural History Museum or Kensington Gardens

The V&A is the world's largest museum of applied arts, decorative arts and design, housing a permanent collection of over 227 million objects. The Natural History Museum is home to life and earth science specimens comprising some 80 million items within five main collections: botany, entomology, mineralogy, palaeontology and zoology. Kensington Gardens is the home of Kensington Palace, the Serpentine Galleries and the Diana Memorial Gardens.
