NEWS FROM THE ARCHIVES

Continuing the series on former HFWI Chairmen this month's column features Mrs. Kit Lushington who held office 1946-1952.

Registered at birth in 1888 in the Barton Regis district, Gloucestershire as Frances Anne K(Katherine) Harrison, she the only daughter of Mr. G.C. Harrison, master at Fettes School and a granddaughter of Bishop Atlay of Hereford. She married Reverend Prebendary Philip Austen Lushington in Knighton district in 1907. She donated her wedding gown to the Hereford City Museum.

From 1909-1914 the couple lived in the Rectory, Breinton where he was vicar. Mrs. Lushington gave Brian Hatton, Hereford's most celebrated artist, his first commission in 1910. He produced a red conté crayon drawing, now held in the Hatton Collection at Hereford Museum. After the First World War, an exhibition, dedicated to Brian Hatton, was opened by Mrs. Lushington. embossed on a leather tag inside'. After thanking members for their kindness and friendship, Mrs Lushington stated that she would continue to work for the institutes as a voluntary county organiser (VCO - now WI Adviser).

Described as a 'forceful personality' she took a prominent part in parish life and had interests in the Herefordshire Musical Competitive Festival and Ross Concert Club.

After a period of poor health, Mrs. Lushington died in her sleep in January 1964 aged 76 at her home in Glewstone. An extensive obituary in the Ross Gazette describes her as a prominent figure in local education. She had been a member of the Herefordshire Education Committee, chairman of governors of Hereford Training College, a vice-chairman of governors of both Ross Grammar and Secondary Modern schools and chairman of Ross Council for Further Education.



Parish records indicate that the Reverend Lushington was vicar of St. Peter's Church in Bromyard from 1927-1934. There his wife became the first president of the newly formed WI in 1928. His next ministry was at Weston under Penyard where he remained until retirement in 1946 and she became president of its WI; she also held this office at Bridstow. The Hereford Times (05/12/1952) reported her retirement from the chairmanship of the Federation as a 'landmark' in its history. She was presented with a 'cream leather handbag with her initials on the front and an inscription

Here's a grisly question - how many pieces of "live meat" does it take to bring up a bluetit family? 20,000! 20,000 grubs, caterpillars, etc... the "ugly bugs" that we might think of as pests. So, if every bluetit on your bird feeder has a family, not to mention other bird species too... it's mind boggling.



Where do those buggy treats come from? Certainly not from bird feeders - bluetit chicks don't leave the nest until they fledge and rely on "wet" food because they can't get water to drink. In those first few weeks, baby birds need natural food - no matter how many nuts, suet balls or seeds we put out, there's no substitute for the real thing.



So where am I going with this? Well, I think we must remember that everything is connected. Feeding adult birds is great, but we need to consider the baby birds too. Those live meals for baby bluetits mainly consist of caterpillars and if the right food plants for those caterpillars aren't available then, quite simply, there won't be so many bluetits on our bird tables next winter.

With the gardening season here, maybe think about providing everything for the birds in one place. Be kind - add some native plants; leave some grass long; give sprays and chemicals a miss. Your garden may be nibbled here and there, but only you will notice, and those baby bluetits will hang off your rosebushes in the summer, giving acrobatic displays while hunting for greenfly.
