"Microplastic fibres are shed from synthetic clothing with every wash and are the main contributors to microplastic contamination of the oceans. The NFWI calls on Government and industry to research and develop innovative solutions to this problem in order to stop the accumulation of microplastic fibres in our oceans"

### What are microplastic fibres?

Microplastic fibres are small plastic fragments 5mm or smaller that are shed from synthetic clothes when laundered and end up in the sea and wider environment. The scale of the problem is large; millions of people wash their clothes every week. shedding these tiny particles that are too small to be caught by the machine's filters, flowing into the sewage system and eventually into the ocean.

Due to their small size microplastic


fibres are readily ingested by aquatic life, filling up their stomachs which can eventually cause death. We also know that these fibres are ending up in the food we eat, the long term effects of which are not yet clear.



BRAMPTON BRYAN had a very interesting talk from Libby Dolloway and Lesley Fleming from the Samaritans. They learnt about the founder, Chad Varah, and its history since 1953. Nowadays people can contact the Samaritans via all internet methods and text message as well as by phone; there are few personal callers. The speakers performed a role play to demonstrate how volunteers listen and focus on the caller in distress. There are about 100 volunteers in the Hereford area. Gill Sumner gave the vote of thanks.

**CRADLEY** had a 'DIY' theme – members were invited to share their experiences, thoughts or passions. One member overcame a terror of getting her face wet to develop a passion for scuba diving; another has become a keen motor biker (pillion only!) donning leathers or equivalent to travel across Europe.
