The Speakers' Auditions Evening held on February 26th was a great success and all five speakers have been invited to join the official Federation speakers list.

Another evening is being arranged for Monday June 25th at 7 pm in St John's Hall, Hereford; the application form and all details will be in the May mailing.

Resolution for the National Annual Meeting

Following the results of members' voting nationwide, one resolution, 'Mental health matters', will go forward to the Annual Meeting.

The resolution reads: "Mental health matters as much as physical health. The NFWI urges all WI members to recognise the importance of parity between mental health and physical health and take action to make it as acceptable to talk about mental health issues as much as physical health issues, and to lobby government for better support for mental illness."

WIs should now consider how they wish their delegate to vote at the Annual Meeting in Cardiff on 6 June 2018. All WIs have one vote on the resolution; they can vote either for or against it, but they may choose to give their delegate discretion to decide how to vote after hearing the speakers' presentations for and against the resolution and the debate at the Annual Meeting. If granting discretion, please give your delegates pointers which will help her decide how to vote on your behalf.

The "My WI" website carries a lot of information about this resolution and discussion and voting on it takes place at your resolution meeting in May. Your delegate must then be informed of your voting wishes.

WI FINANCE

Further to various queries that have arisen in recent months, it was felt that it would be useful to clarify certain matters relating to WI Finance.

The money in your WI account belongs to the charity (i.e. your WI, not members). It is up to the committee (charity trustees) to propose how the money may be used and then put to the members for their decision. The WI must ask whether it is a modest, justifiable and a reasonable use of charitable funds, serving WI purposes.

Rule 42 of the Constitution (2013) states that: The funds of the WI must be applied for the purpose of carrying out the objects of the WI in accordance with this Constitution and for no other purpose.

Any charity must spend funds to deliver its objects. There is a document on 'My WI' which outlines what WI Funds may be used for, however it is also in order to use funds for WI anniversaries including celebratory glass of wine, small gifts to retiring officers or those who have performed special service and cards for members, subject to members' agreement and this should be minuted. All money (cash and cheques) received must go through WI Funds and be accounted for. There should be a clear paper trail showing money paid into the WI Account and paid out. There should not be sums of money kept outside the WI account by individual members at their homes. Please do get in contact with your Adviser team if you have any more questions about WI Finance.

Craft has always been a big part of the WI and we know that many members are keen crafters. However, monthly meetings are usually not long enough or involve too many people for members to have hands-on experience. Some WIs have separate craft groups; others might just want to add an occasional workshop to their programme.

take the opportunity to try them out.

STOKE PRIOR & DISTRICT WI

Nearly 30 years ago our then President wrote the following article to celebrate the Stoke Prior & District WI's 60th anniversary.

"The Stoke Prior and District W.I. was founded in 1929 with 37 members meeting monthly in the school room on Saturday afternoons. Jumble sales, whist drives and teas were held (1shilling including refreshments) to raise money towards the cost of building a village hall. This was completed in 1934 and the first meeting in the new hall took place on 8th December. 'Jerusalem' has been sung at meetings

since 1934. Previously, it seems, they sang the National Anthem. For many years, primroses and daffodils were gathered and sent to local and London hospitals. A founder member donated seed potatoes which were planted in a competition for the highest yield to be sent to the hospital. In 1987 several members embroidered a beautiful altar frontal, depicting the church, the pub, the school, and several houses as well as flora and fauna of the village. It was dedicated at a special service in 1988. Every member looks forward to our annual lunch, this year February 21st, 1989 is our 60th Birthday. Stoke Prior is a pleasant, friendly village and we like it".



Now, nearly 30 years later we still hold our meetings in the same village hall but now on the second



Tuesday afternoon of the month, so we are still contributing to its upkeep. Fund raisers for local charities are still an important part of our remit. The altar frontal is still used in Stoke Prior Church on special occasions. Our members now number 22. Our annual programme offers a wide range of activities including a variety of outings, interesting speakers and a monthly competition which nearly all our ladies enter. We are a very friendly and sociable group and we still celebrate our birthday every Spring with a party. The Spring of 2019 will be our 90th anniversary and we have plans to mark

this special day with a memorable celebration!


DO IT FOR DENMAN

Gordon has for 33 years been official photographer for Hereford Cathedral so it was no surprise to find his stills of churches, houses and Herefordshire countryside absolutely beautiful

Members of **STOKE PRIOR & DISTRICT WI** were enthralled when they welcomed Jane Davey to their February meeting who gave a PowerPoint presentation on Faberge Eggs

Carol Bond, a teacher of Tai Chi Movements for Wellbeing, was the February speaker for the **SPARKLING WYE WI**.

Carol explained that this is a simple, very flexible, sequence of movements performed within an individual's comfort zone. Based on Tai Chi and Chi Kung tradition & easy to learn, the benefits can quickly be noticed with daily practice

SALTMARSHE & DISTRICT WI'S speaker was Mr. John Turrell who talked about "Skeletons in



the Cupboard". This was about Family History, which as anybody who's also delved into their ancestors knows, can throw up some interesting characters; from bigamists, liars and criminals of all kinds to those who became victims of murderers! He led us through the steps a beginner might find helpful but stressed the most important thing is to talk to family members while they're still here and can



answer questions. Mrs. Margaret Roy was our inspiring Speaker at our March meeting, when she led us through the Wye Valley Walk. The whole walk came about when the Roys

lived in Malvern but travelled regularly to Pembrokeshire, thereby crossing over the Wye. The logo for the walk is of a leaping salmon which can be seen on signposts and waymarkers as you journey along.

Mr. Graham Wren came to **ASTON INGHAM WI** to give us a talk and show us slides of 'The Emerald Isle.' Mr. Wren used to take groups of Americans on tours to Ireland, he would take them to various islands and to towns like Galway which is very colourful with a busy market.



Gill Bullock gave a very interesting talk to **STAUNTON ON ARROW WI** about taking part in the Ride Across Britain, from Lands End to John O Groats. She rode 966 miles in 9 days, averaging 108 miles a day with the longest day being 128 miles. It was a fully supported ride with 800 participants.

The audience were mesmerised & enthralled by his dexterity!
