#### **RESOLUTION: Clean Rivers for People and Wildlife**

Inspired by the River Wye's dreadful state, our Herefordshire resolution is being put forward for adoption at May's national Annual Meeting. It obviously resonated across the country because sadly the Wye is not an isolated case. Having both good ecological and good chemical status means a river is as close as possible to its natural state. Currently, no river in the UK has both. Post-Brexit, an EU mandate requiring good status be achieved for all waterways by 2027 no longer applies to the UK. Things have slipped so far here that 2063 is now our target – a date beyond most of our lifetimes.

The UK's rivers are heading towards environmental collapse due to pollution, posing a serious threat to human health but also destroying ecosystems and ultimately threatening ocean recovery. Without regular testing, there is no way of knowing how polluted rivers affect our health.

Official Bathing Water Designation creates "blue" spaces where water quality must be officially monitored for harmful bacteria and viruses. Where necessary, there is a legal requirement to improve water quality for human health, with the knock on benefit that has for wildlife.

Water quality at beaches around the country has hugely improved due to using bathing water standards. 98% of designated beaches now meet minimum standards, up from just 27% in the 1990s. Bathing water status indicates the state of our water, driving real change.

Voting FOR at your WI meeting will help this resolution to become a campaign.

#### TREE PLANTING

Following their Annual Meeting the committee of Cradley WI, accompanied by Adviser Cherril Watkins, placed a commemorative plaque alongside the Red Sentinel crab apple tree they had planted two weeks previously to mark the reign of the late Queen Elizabeth II.

The tree appears to be thriving in its new home, showing signs of budding already, and we hope it will be a haven for the local wildlife for many years to come.

Your WI's Vote (For or Against) must be sent to your Link Delegate by the beginning of May.

WIs should now consider how they wish their delegate to vote on the resolution at the NFWI Annual Meeting in Cardiff on 25 May 2023. All WIs get ONE vote – FOR or AGAINST the resolution.

#### A LANDMARK BIRTHDAY FOR KIMBOLTON!



#### **NEWS FROM THE ARCHIVES**

To date, the only titled Chairman of HFWI was **Lady Hope Jackson** (1966-68) (not to be confused with her predecessor Mrs. Helen Jackson (1963-66). Lady Hope, the only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. B.W. Gilmore of Pollockshields, Glasgow, married Mr. W.F. Jackson (as he then was) in 1923. He was Labour MP for Brecon & Radnor during the war years becoming Baron Jackson of Glewstone in the Dissolution of Parliament Honours.

Between 1918 and 1939 Lady Jackson took a great interest in the musical life of the Ross district. Her rich soprano voice was put to good effect in productions staged by the Ross Operatic and Dramatic Society of which she was one time president and chairman. She gave many years service to the Women's Institute being a member of several local

institutes and of the county executive committee. She was appointed a magistrate in 1934 with a seat on the Harewood End bench and chairman in 1951. 3 years later, after the amalgamation with Ross she became chairman of the juvenile panel until 1967. Among her other interests was education she was a governor at Ross Secondary Modern School from its inception in 1953 and ten years later became the first woman chairman of governors of Ross Grammar School.

She was also a chairman of Herefordshire Beekeepers' Association and vice president of Ross Town Band. Lady Jackson died in September 1980, aged seventy seven.

#### **ACWW**

#### A final word from your Herefordshire Associated Country Women of the World rep

Update on the current relationship between ACWW and the W.I. Since Covid 19 when fund-raising came to a standstill, certain changes were made by ACWW management so that:

- "Pennies for Friendship" and the Women Empowered Fund were closed!
- There is no ability now, to direct your fund raising towards a particular project.
- The Rural Women in Action Fund (new name) is to be used to direct your donations to projects which are identified by ACWW management or for their office use.
- Projects will have more flexibility built in to add features or extend periods of activity for a better outcome
- The logo has been redesigned, moving away from a compass framework to a "bracket".
- A global network of co-ordinators are receiving training, will have resources supplied to deliver a co-ordinated presentation and have links to ACWW Presidents for their region.
- The changes have not been taken to the triennial conference for member agreement which has caused concern.
- The same amount of funding will be distributed to women's groups but to a fewer number of projects.

Some of the county WI representatives like myself, have resigned their positions. After having supported ACWW enthusiastically for many years, two have been "blacklisted" by ACWW for criticising their motives and methods. Since being informed of this, National W.I. has given advice that WIs are at liberty to raise funds for whichever cause they feel important to them, including ACWW. They are not recommending that we cut links with them, this would be catastrophic as 75% of their funding has come from WIs in the past. They are creating other funding streams to ensure stability.

I have been particularly concerned that the period of project interruption was much longer than the Covid disruption necessitated. However, project information is now filtering down to members and work seems to be progressing. Rural Women are still suffering throughout the world by not having their voices heard and the ACWW is at least one line of communication and support for them. So I would urge you to continue to raise funds for ACWW if you can, to help our fellow womenfolk by whatever method you can. The Women Walk the World activity takes place on 29th April annually and is one event that can be easily organised to raise funds.

As I have not requested a position as ACWW Co-ordinator I will be unable to access their resources and visit your WIs to explain the work they are doing. For this, I am very sorry as I have enjoyed meeting your amazing groups in the short period that I have been the Herefordshire representative. If you would like to take up the challenge of Co-ordinator, contact ACWW. They will welcome your interest. If you would like to support in a small way, pay for annual membership at £27, some of your funds will go towards the women who request help. If you raise funds within your W.I. I would recommend that you use the ACWW website to pay by BACS as the safest and easiest form of payment.

Many thanks for all your help and support and don't forget those women who need us!

#### **PUBLIC AFFAIRS AND CAMPAIGNS**

Many thanks to all HFWI members who selected a resolution from the shortlist for 2023.

Below are the results for Herefordshire

Out of the 848 federation members (71%) who selected the results were as follows:-

1. Save water. 173 (15%)

2. Women tea workers. 38 (3%)

3. Online gambling. 95 (8%)

4. Clean rivers. 542 (45%)

The results were submitted to National Public Affairs on 21 February.

This year over 93,000 selections were cast, a positive increase on last year's figures.

The NFWI Board of Trustees has agreed to put forward the top (one) resolution to the Annual Meeting in May.

The wording of the resolution is as follows:

#### Clean rivers for people and wildlife

Water quality in our rivers is shameful. Legally, designated bathing waters must be regularly monitored for pollution. The NFWI urges its members, the wider public, local authorities and Government to make, support and promote applications for official designated bathing sites on appropriate stretches of rivers in their area. This will be as instrumental to the clean up of rivers as it has been for water quality improvement at coastal beaches.

At the end of April, beginning of May discussion and debate will take place in your WI.

As a WI you will vote FOR or AGAINST the resolution becoming a mandate (campaign).

Your WI secretary will then pass your decision to the delegate representing you at Cardiff.

At this stage may I thank you for your support in this process.

There was honey to taste, and we were able to see Di's work at close quarters. A fascinating morning.



**Much Cowarne WI** organised their January meeting at Stoke Lacy Village Hall to incorporate a coffee morning open to visitors, this was a successful event with a bring and buy table and raffle. February's speaker Shirley Edgar gave a very interesting talk on Associated Country Women of the World (ACWW). The organisation contributes funding to enable women in less fortunate countries to be heard and seen as valuable members of society. WI's work closely with ACWW, helping with fund raising and making aware of women's undervalued contribution to society in these developing countries.

Saltmarshe & District WI - a good turn-out to hear Tessa Lovell's presentation as the Archivist for HFWI. She gave us practical tips about the best way to ensure items are preserved for future generations. It was especially lovely to learn more about our own WI's past. On 6th March 1946 a formation meeting was held incorporating Tedstone Delamere, Tedstone Wafre, Saltmarshe, Edvin Loach and Norton and the annual subscription set at 2 s 6d (13p in today's money). The format of meetings then still takes place to-

day; we have the Business section, a talk or demonstration, tea and a social get together. In June 1952 on Saltmarshe Castle Green 2,000 members of the WI met for the County Picnic. All but six of the 110 Institutes in

the County were represented, many taking part in the colourful parade. It's sobering to learn that today there are only 48 Institutes continuing in Herefordshire but with a 1,200 Membership. We made a big fuss of Norma, who'll celebrate a big birthday later this year and who wore her Saltmarshe WI sweatshirt from years ago with pride.
